"The Historical books tell the story of the Covenant People from the entry into the Promised Land to the return from exile, and the Maccabean revolt . In the Hebrew Bible, six of these books—Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, and 1 and 2 Kings—are gathered in the section known as Nebi'im (Prophets) and are known as the Early or the Former, Prophets. This draws attention to their character of making God's purpose and action in history known. Ruth, Esther, Ezra, Nehemiah, and 1 and 2 Chronicles are in the section known as the Kethubim (Writings). In Christian Bibles, the Historical books are not given a separate name but are distinguished from the books of the Prophets (the Wisdom books come between the two). There are also differences in Christian Bibles about the books to be included, because the Roman Catholic and the Orthodox Bibles include books that others place in the Apocrypha.
