Mantle—A piece of clothing, similar to a robe, but which usually just goes around the neck and over the shoulders. When worn by religious leaders, serves as a symbol of authority.



Transferring the Mantle

"When a newly called leader comes into our lives, we need to recognize that no two leaders or their ministries are the same. Yet they have one thing in common: they are expected to bring all that they are and have to the altar of God and offer it for the benefit and blessing of those over whom they preside." (Bruce L. "When I read this wonderful story [about Elisha guiding Israel in a war with Syria], I always identified with the young servant of Elisha. I thought, If I am ever surrounded by the forces of evil while I am in the Lord's service, I hope the Lord will open my eyes and give me faith to understand that when we are in the work of the Lord, those who are with us are always more powerful than those who oppose us" (*Ensign*, Nov. 1992, 39)

- What can the story of Naaman teach us about following the counsel of the prophet—even when we may not like or understand it or when it may be about small or simple matters?
